RE-ACCREDITATION:

June 2, 2026, the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission approved the York County Regional Police Department as a re-accredited agency. The initial accreditation was attained in 2008 with York Area Regional and Spring Garden Township was initially approved in 2009. Northeastern Regional was in the accreditation program but did not receive an accreditation status before 2022.

With these 3 departments now working as one agency; the professionalism in policing is the standard for the Department and the employees.

There is still a relatively small number of Pennsylvania police departments that have undertaken this endeavor to show compliance of over 120 standards on a continuous basis.

The Department continues to stand out from other agencies to go above and beyond the minimum standard of policing for our communities.

Police departments that have achieved 6 accreditation cycles (18 years) are approved to be a “premier agency” designated by PLEAC. Spring Garden Township did achieve this recognition, and York Area would have achieved this recognition albeit for a name change of the police department. Due to the police mergers that status is not recognized by our Department. That does not deter us as we have achieved this recognition of accreditation and -reaccreditation the requisite number of times necessary for the **Premier Agency** status.

TIME MANAGEMENT

Overall, the Department operated approximately 73% of the time providing operational services to the municipalities. This means that seven (7) out of every 10 minutes a police officer was working on a call-for-service, investigating an accident, taking a criminal report, follow-up investigation or attending a court hearing. Three (3) out of those minutes go toward administrative time which includes paid time off, training, or administrative duties that benefit the entire Department.

The highest percentage is 77% and the low is at 69% at the mid-year point with the average being 73% overall.

Time will continue to reduce from the municipality totals as retirements occur and the SROs start back with the schools in the Fall.

Criminal Arrests – overall decrease.

These areas will be monitored for areas of improvement and effectiveness to reduce crime overall but also crime trends that sporadically appear from time to time.

PERSONNEL:

Currently the Department is fully staffed with the complement of sworn police officers needed to meet the PPU's and to meet operational needs.

There are 4 officers currently on some type of non-active-duty status. (3) medical and (1) pregnancy leave.

This may impact on the percentage of operational time vs. administrative time with this many officers on administrative assignment.

The Police Department is one of very few, from the others that I have heard from or see the job postings listed, that is fully staffed. We have more applications from police officers seeking a lateral hire than we have positions opened. This is positive for the Department; one, for being able to process a new hire relatively quickly and second, other officers have heard positive information about the police department to seek employment here.

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS:

The Criminal Investigations Unit is staffed with (8) eight detectives including the Detective Sergeant.

Sergeant Barley is retiring in August and Sgt. Buschman has been working alongside him during this time period for a smooth transition process to take place.

2 officers have rotated into the detective office for an evaluation period before a recommendation is fully made for an assignment to that division.

Several grants are in process to enhance and bolster the investigative unit to provide for more training, resources and equipment.

One item that we are seeing an increase in is cryptocurrency fraud. Crypto currency is relatively new and loosely regulated so the training and experience on this is not very in depth at this point, but Det. Harbaugh has taken this matter seriously and has worked with several officers from various agencies throughout Pennsylvania to create a working group to share ideas and investigative tips to understand this criminal activity from an investigator's perspective.

PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

The Department's website consists of many informational items to include links to our social media sites: Facebook, Instagram and X.

We continue to inform the public about our website and services that the Department can provide or request through the website or other electronic means.

NEEDS:

The Police Department's biggest needs at this time are equipment related. Specifically, vehicles are in need of replacement or additional vehicles to reduce the amount of hours and miles that a particular vehicle is being driven. The opportunity to purchase vehicles is limited based on the manufacturer's ability to produce a certain number of vehicles in a given time

period (year). When agencies submit a large purchase order this impacts on all the smaller orders that would be available for us to acquire vehicles.

We are utilizing our grant applications to focus on these areas, and we will see how these grant applications are processed soon.

Equipment related to investigations and software usage is another area of importance and grant focused applications.

The Police Department received or requested several letters of support from the Department of Homeland Security, the Office of the U.S. Attorney – Middle District of Pennsylvania and the York County District Attorney's Office. These letters may assist the Department in the grant application process to achieve some of the funding available to assist with new equipment purchases, software upgrades and retention of the current programs we are using in criminal investigations.
